


The fees may seem quite high, but we do strive to attract the very best presenters and artists.

MAG ART TIPS

Money-Making Miniatures



The idea of miniatures is an experiment initially which we are trialing this year.

The first Exhibition in which a miniatures table will be included is Flagstaff Hill Rotary Art Show taking place from the 21st to 28th April. A 'Miniatures' section on our internal entry forms will be provided and will need to be returned by Monday 26th March.

The size and price range explained below were set at a meeting with the Flagstaff Hill Rotary Art Show Committee.

The miniatures will be consistent in size. 8×10 cm or 10×10 cm and can be on canvas or watercolour paper. These will be for sale to the public, with all proceeds **donated** to our MAG funds.

- MAG will incur some cost in supplying the canvases, the watercolour paper, window mounts with backing, and little miniature easels on which to display the art pieces.
- You the artist, donate your time and expertise and your paint.
- You decide the price on your work. Choose from \$15, \$20 or \$25.

All sales will go to MAG. For many of us this is something new. Suggestions:

- Ask for advice from other members who have had some experience with painting miniatures. See Jim for names of members who may be able to help.
- Subject and composition possibilities need to be carefully considered. Try out things on cheap watercolour paper or small pieces of canvas paper.
- You may need to acquire some smaller brushes. I suggest a needle neef squirrel brush which may help with extra fine detail. This is a watercolour brush which can be used for acrylic if it is well looked after. (cost starting from \$23.50 from Art to Art).
